Thursday, September 19, 2024 – Meeting Minutes

Approval of Minutes:

Michael Markou made a motion to approve the board minutes from the June 20, 2024 meeting. It was seconded by Michael Markou. All approved, none opposed; motion carried.

NYS Workforce Funding Opportunities by Empire State Development:

Brian Williams introduced Meghan Kayser from Empire State Development Office of Strategic Workforce Development. Ms. Kayser presented the many grant opportunities for organizations and businesses to train individuals, job seekers, and current employees, The slide deck from Ms. Kayser is attached to these minutes.

Capital Region Labor Market Information:

Kevin Alexander, the Capital Region Labor Market Analyst presented on the current labor market statistics and trends in the Capital Region. The slide deck from Mr. Alexander is attached to these minutes.

Upstate New York Healthcare Career Pathways Program:

Brian Williams introduced Tosha Grimmer from the Iroquois Healthcare Alliance, who is administering the Caring Gene Healthcare Career Pathways project for much of the Upstate New York counties under the NYS Medicaid 1115 Demonstration Waiver. Ms. Gimmer also introduced her colleague Grace Rust and presented this unique tuition assistance program in 13 different healthcare job titles. The slide deck from Ms. Gimmer and Ms. Rust is attached to these minutes.

Youth & Emerging Worker Committee Update:

Presented by Michael Markou, Committee Chair

Mr. Markou reported that the Committee is working with Center for Economic Growth on their "What's So Cool About Manufacturing" project highlighting its focus on creating awareness about manufacturing careers among middle school students. The Project's structure involves students creating videos about local manufacturers and their processes, and the goal of breaking down misconceptions about the industry. The project will culminate with about a dozen schools presenting their videos and upcoming awards ceremony at Proctor's Theater in the Spring. Mr. Markou then provided an update on engaging with youth and young adults, highlighting his participation with Albany's Summer Youth. Through this "listening tour", Mr. Markou presented the Youth's Needs and Definitions of Success of the top five needs of youth from a job and employer standpoint, emphasizing the importance of money, respect, communication, health insurance, and affordable housing. Additionally, the six factors that the youth consider as defining success, including home ownership, financial stability, a healthy family, happiness, and growing assets.

Executive Committee Update:

Presented by Jim Hurley, Committee Chair

Mr. Hurley presented that the resolution *Transfer of Title I Dislocated Worker Funds and Adult Funds* had been approved by Executive Committee on 9/5/24. Mr. Hurley stated that this is a standard procedure that gives the WIOA grant recipient the ability to transfer funds between Title I Dislocated Worker and Adult funding streams as needed to ensure service to all customers and that no one is turned away. Mr. Williams noted that as per WIOA regulations, the Executive Committee has the authority to pass this resolution, but that the full Board needs to concur with its adoption. As there is not a full quorum at this point of the meeting, this resolution was tabled until the December Board Meeting.

Rensselaer

- Lansingburgh schools had an educational component added to the program. They brought the youth team to HVCC every Wednesday for guest speakers. These speakers came from a variety of businesses within the community and they were able to give the youth a visual of what it takes to be employed, skills needed, and how to save money once employed.
- Two youth individuals came up with a marketing plan for the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Capital Area. The Business plan is called "Keeping It 100" and is aimed at promoting community engagement and program awareness through creative and authentic digital content.

Schenectady

- Kicked off the program with an in-person, half-day orientation where youth learned our policies and procedures (including the requisite sexual harassment prevention training) and engaged in break-out groups that taught foundational skills through interactive activities like Jeopardy, a team-building hula hoop contest and a workplace situation "what would you do" situation.
- revived and revitalized our Job Shadowing Program where youth had the opportunity to spend a few hours at a variety of local employers, learning about the different job opportunities available:
